Continued from page 1 Edwards, Laura Mayer, Rana Silver and Tami Velasquez. Board terms currently held by Kirsten Goodlett and Sarah Swanson are not up for election until 2025.

The district plans to hold a candidates' forum in the school auditorium at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 11. Gilpin County High School Student Council members will moderate the forum, which is open to the public.

Boulder Valley RE-2 School District

The northern section of Gilpin County and a portion of the mid-county area are part of the Boulder Valley RE-2 School District, which includes Boulder and Broomfield counties and a region spanning from the local mountains to the City of Boulder, Gold Hill, Nederland, Jamestown, Lafayette, Louisville, Superior and Ward.

Local voters are part of the district's "C" region, which stretches from Superior west through South Boulder and into the northern parts of Gilpin County. There are approximately 2,417 voters in Gilpin County (including 1,277 Unaffiliated, 707 Democrats and 381 Republicans) who cast ballots in the Boulder Valley RE-2 election. The Boulder Valley district doesn't operate any buildings within Gilpin County, so students from that attendance area attend classes at the Nederland Elementary School or the Nederland Middle-High School.

Four of the seven board seats are up for election this fall as the terms of Board President Kathy Gebhardt, Vice President Lisa Sweeney-Miran, and members Stacey Zis and Richard Garcia will expire. None of the four will run again, some because of term limits.

Ten candidates have applied to run for the four seats. In local District C, Alex Medler, Cynthia Nevison and Andrew Steffl are running for the seat that includes parts of Gilpin County. Voters throughout the district, however, will cast votes to elect all four board representatives.

Also running in other parts of the Boulder Valley district

are Andrew Brandt and Lalenia Quinlan Awieda (District D), Jorge Chavez, Stuart Lord and Anil Pesaramelli (District G), Neil Fishman and Jason Unger (District A).

The Boulder Valley School District Parent Council, Impact on Education group and the League of Women Voters in Boulder County will hold a candidate forum on Wednesday, Oct. 18, at the BVSD Education Center, 6500 E. Arapahoe Road, Boulder. The forum is scheduled to be streamed online at www.bvsd. org/bv22.

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for the long-term conservation of Colorado's public lands and the quality of the visitor experience.

The eight agencies include the U.S. Forest Service; Arapaho & Roosevelt National Forests and Pawnee National Grassland; Colorado Parks & Wildlife, Northeast Region; National Park Service: Rocky Mountain National Park; Boulder County; Clear Creek County; Gilpin County; Jefferson County and Larimer County.

Recently, Hollingworth participated in a NoCO tour that invited U.S. Congressional aides from states spanning from Minnesota to Colorado. The tour was hosted by Forest Supervisor Monte Williams and Arapahoe-Roosevelt Forest leaders. Steve Coffin of NoCO, Shannon Schaller of CPW, and Hollingsworth presented on the NoCO 2050 regional approach to public lands recreation and conservation manage-

ment. The tour included a stop for discussion of public lands vegetation and fire management strategies.

Lauren Boebert, all attended from Colorado plus ones from New Mexico, Minnesota, Mississippi, Montana, Missouri, Georgia and Arkansas. For some, it was their first time to Colorado. They did the loop hike around Brainard Lake, which has implemented timed entry and also parking areas to help manage the flow of recreationalists.

NoCO has received recent grants from Colorado Parks and Wildlife and Mighty Arrow Family Foundation grants to further the regional approach work that began five years ago. NOCO has been undergoing user frequency at locations data and trail mapping to help inform areas of most impact for trail management planning purposes and for further public education on enjoying authorized trails, high use impacts, and preparation before heading into public lands areas to promote safety.
